

Today, they were being recognized for passing their 7th and 9th grade exams. One student stood apart. Lyford Ngoma received his twelfth grade certificate this year, graduating from Parkland High School in Chilanga.

It had been a long road for Lyford and he felt the enormity of his accomplishment. Since the death of his father eight years ago, he has lived in Linda compound with his mother, two brothers and three sisters. He had earlier attended Munolo Basic School where Mrs. Kamabe was his math teacher and he was in Luse Lwanfumu's feeding program. Although Lyford is the middle child, he is the only one in his family to complete high school. Because of the expenses required, his brother dropped out of secondary school.

After opening remarks from the women of Linda, he stood and spoke from his prepared remarks. He expressed his joy on completing high school and his gratitude for the support of CWB to make it possible. He shared his dream of attending university to study economics and medicine.

After the certificate ceremony, traveler Erika Pond had the opportunity to speak with him personally. Lyford has applied to university and is waiting to hear if he is accepted. His biggest worry remains financial. Even with the support of CWB, he did not have the funds to pay for the bus and walked 6 kilometers each way to secondary school. Despite this, he remains optimistic. He spends his time working to save enough money to buy a laptop computer and feels grateful for all he has been given.

Being established as an NGO in Zambia will help us in a number of ways. First, it will allow us to actively seek out partnerships with Communities Without Borders just concluded one of the most successful fundraisers in our history raising approximately \$16,000 to send needy children to school.
