

Grant Phiri: Hopes to Give Back to His Community

If CWB were to have a “Poster Child”, Grant Phiri would certainly be among the top contenders for the position. Grant is a 20-year old student who is completing the 12th grade at Highland High School. He has been supported by CWB since he enrolled in the Mandevu pre-school in 1999 at the age of 6 — the very year that CWB began operations in Zambia. Since then, Grant has completed primary school, successfully passed the national exams at the 7th and 9th grade levels, and is now looking forward to graduating from high school and entering college to study medicine.

Grant’s story is similar to so many other CWB supported children, all of which makes his accomplishments that much more remarkable. His parents died when he was only four years old. Along with his younger brother Eddy, Grant went to live with his grandmother. In addition to Grant and Eddy there were five other grandchildren to care for. All were squeezed into a tiny three-room house; of which one room is rented out for a monthly income of approximately \$60 used to purchase food and other essentials for the seven children. There is no kitchen or running water in the house and only a pit latrine and small bathing area serves as a bathroom. The cooking is done outside on a small charcoal fire, a challenge during the rainy season. One of Grant’s primary responsibilities is to collect the daily water for the household from

a community spigot. He does this at 5 o’clock in the morning to ensure there is sufficient water for everyone because water only runs from 6 PM to 6 AM each day.

After finishing the rest of his chores, Grant dresses for school in his black and white school uniform with a black tie. He leaves his house around 11:30 am in order to walk the four and one-half miles to attend the afternoon school session which begins at 1 o’clock and ends at 5:30. Most days he walks alone and often without additional nourishment. His classroom is large with over 50 students.

He enjoys his teacher, Mrs. Phiri (no relation), and Grant especially likes geography, mathematics, science, and English. After school he plays soccer for the school team.

His dream is to become a doctor. He wants to help people like himself in his own community of Mandevu. Grant is deeply appreciative of the opportunity he has been afforded through the continuing support of CWB. Without this assistance he believes he likely would have ended up on the street. Now he has a bright future to look forward to and for that he is very grateful.
